

The mission of Fort Mill Elementary School and community is to provide a quality education for our students. This process includes establishing a foundation for life-long learners who are responsible individuals and confident problem solvers in an everchanging world. Our strong partnerships with our parents and community are the basis of our work together as we provide our students with world class knowledge, world class skills, and preparation for the global economy. Our motto this year was, "Teachers Change the World One Child at a Time," and we focused on providing intervention and enrichment to meet individual student needs, and to support student perseverance, self-direction, and social and emotional skills through a mentoring program. We seek to provide real world experiences, and students learn strategies for critical thinking and utilize technology throughout each curriculum area. Our students have accessed a variety of enriched and real-world learning experiences such as History in a Backpack, Lego Robotics, Camp Invention and Junior Achievement in a Day to develop authentic problem solving skills, creativity and collaboration. As an outcome of our efforts with Junior Achievement in a Day, we were awarded the Catawba Regional Junior Achievement School of the Year for financial literacy initiatives. Additionally, we received the Palmetto Gold Award for academic achievement. Our character education program, "We Bring the Sting," highlights Service, Teamwork, Integrity, the Need to Succeed, and Generosity. We were also named a No Place For Hate school by the Jewish Anti-Defamation League. Through these initiatives we are supporting character development, a global perspective, and interpersonal skills. We have several student teams, such as our Recycling Club, our News Team, and our Student Council who work together to support our school and to develop leadership skills. For example, our News Team interviews teachers and staff, and creates their own scripts and videos for the daily news broadcast. Our Student Council has organized several charitable initiatives and special events for our students and community. 


The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing
